G.I. GURDIEFF MEETINGS WITH REMARKABLE MEN

First published by E. P. Dutton in 1963, Meetings with Remarkable Men is the second book by the extraordinary mystic philosopher and teacher who died in 1949, but whose work continues here and abroad through the Gurdjieff Foundation and whose first book is All and Everything. Originally written to be read aloud within the circle of Gurdjieff's pupils, Meetings with Remarkable Men presents us with the key itself to the life of the Great Master as it describes Gurdjieff's search for answers to the fundamental questions of life throughout remote areas of the world.

Meetings with Remarkable Men can be read both as a psychological autobiography and as a colorful narrative. It consists of a series of stories, each bearing as its title the name of one of the men Gurdjieff knew in his formative years. Although these men have no particular claim to fame, Gurdjieff calls them remarkable because they all shared a consuming desire to understand the deepest mysteries of life and were not dismayed by the obstacles encountered during the course of their search.

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
